<u>Ask a Clinician</u>



Question: What is DIRFloortime[®] and who benefits most from this style of therapy?

Answer: The Developmental, Individual-differences, & Relationship-based (DIR®) model was developed by Dr. Stanley Greenspan and his colleagues to serve as a framework for assessing and understanding each child's individual strengths and challenges.

Floortime is the application of the DIR® model into practice. The Floortime approach emphasizes following the child's lead and building powerful, meaningful connections in play. Per the Interdisciplinary Council on Development and Learning (ICDL) website <www.icdl.com>, "DIRFloortime® (also known as Floortime) is an intervention that is used to promote an individual's development through a respectful, playful, joyful, and engaging process. It uses the power of relationships and human connections to promote engagement, communication, positive behaviors, and thinking."

The Floortime approach is beneficial for a variety of children including but not limited to those with Autism Spectrum Disorders, Social Communication Disorders, and Sensory Processing Disorders. This approach can be integrated and used within 1:1 therapy sessions at this Center. It will also be incorporated into many of the social communication group sessions that we offer going forward.
